

## **Professor Hua Zhu**

My research lies at the intersection of comparative global rhetorics and the transnational writing pedagogies. I join in the disciplinary discussion of global rhetorics by studying Chinese rhetoric in dialogue with other rhetorical traditions, by employing comparative methadology – a critical lens that studies both the cultural specificity of rhetoric and the dialogism between rhetorics, by attending to pedagogical experiences of writing teachers that are marked as "non-Western," and by forming allyship between comparative rhetoric and decolonial studies. For example, in my current single-authored book project, I recover a rhetorical action of speaking to power from



ancient Chinese treatises and historical anecdotes, and further foster a critical and self-reflective comparative dialogue between the classical Chinese rhetorical concept and acts of power subversion from other rhetorical traditions. In doing so, I envision a new rhetorical theory for reorienting power transformation in today's global contact zones from antithetical resistance to critical engagement.

Another project that showcases my research interests is a special issue that I am co- editing with my colleagues for the journal *Rhetorical Society Quarterly*. This special issue aims to clarify and reimagine the relationship between comparative rhetoric and decolonial scholarship and to consider how rhetoricians and writing scholars might bring together the two areas to study global rhetorics in ways that interdependence and pluriversality become possible.

**BIOGRAPHY:** Dr. Zhu is an Assistant Professor of Writing and Rhetoric Studies at the University of Utah. Her research lies at the intersections of comparative global rhetorics, non-Eurocentric history of rhetoric, and transnational writing pedagogies. Dr. Zhu has published in Rhetoric Society Quarterly, The Routledge Handbook of Comparative Rhetorics, Rhetorical Review, Rhetorica, and Composition Forum.

May, I stood beside my student Portia at the department award ceremony. She won the award for the best student paper in Writing 2010, and I received an award for my graduate student paper. I was also chosen to be the graduate WPA. That was the first time I felt like I truly belonged.

In my second year, I collaborated on the 2010 curriculum with our WPA Jon Stone and helped to plan orientation for our new

graduate student instructors (GSIs). I became passionate about ensuring that they were familiar with the U's resources, like the counseling center and the food pantry, which can not only help them, but also the first-year students they teach.



In May, I stood again at our department award ceremony. My revised paper from the previous year, written in Dr. Jenny Andrus's class, won an award for best conference paper. It also received an honorable mention and cash prize from the College of Humanities, and I presented it at the RSA Conference in Denver in May.

Starting the PhD program was a big leap out of my comfort zone. But someone once told me that there is no growth in the comfort zone and no comfort in the growth zone. Even in my third year, I'm not completely comfortable, but I do feel like I truly belong at the **U**.
